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Preface

Till 1981, for the inhabitants of the greater Changsari and adjoining area dreaming a dream of higher education was merely a great impossible task. However, setting aside all the obstacles, with initiative of few pioneer personalities that dream come to true on 21st July, 1981 through the establishment of Saraighat College (Arts stream). This college is ideally situated in heart of greater Changsari area. N.H. No. 31 which is in front of the college provides a good communication network with the rest of the region.

Under the dynamic leadership of Mr. Hareswar Nath, the Founder Principal of Saraighat College and its dedicated teaching staff and non-teaching staff this institution has so far disseminated higher education both vertically and horizontally among the students those belong to every section of the society. After long period of time the college has accorded deficit grants-in-aid status in 1998. Presently there are a total of 11 (Eleven) Departments of which 8 (Eight) Deptts offer Major and general Courses. There are 1515 students in this college including the + 2 and U.G. levels. There are 26 (Twenty six) permanent and 12(Twelve) are appointed on contractual basis. The non-teaching and library staff include 13 permanent and I (one) temporary members.

The college campus consists of the Arts Section under Gauhati University and Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University, the two storied (RCC) building of Library, Seminars Hall and Language Lab, Womens' Hostel and an Indoor Stadium which is under construction.

Since its inception, the College has been working with a missionary zeal to promote higher education in the region and achieved its goal to a considerable extend.

To identify its strengths and weaknesses the college has got itself accredited by the NAAC in the year 2004. During the first visit, the NAAC peer team pointed out the advantages and failings of the college and objectively offered their recommendation. Following these suggestions and recommendations the college has strived to fulfill them and remove those shortcomings in the subsequent period of time.

As per our perception we have prepared an account of our strengths and weaknesses which has been compiled according to the specific criteria prescribed by the NAAC.

Executive Summary

Established in 1981, Saraighat College is the only institution of higher education in the greater Changsari area. During the course of about twenty years of journey the college has been striving untiringly to spread the ray of education among the rural populace, overcoming various hazards and challenges.

From its inception, the college has been working with a missionary zeal to promote higher education among the womenfolk and socially backwards.

The college was inaugurated on 21st July, 1981. The classes started with 116 students and a staff of 8 teachers and 2 officials. Initially, only the intermediate (Arts) classes were held but with the passage of time the college develop into a full-fledged Degree (Arts) college. The college was brought under deficit grant-in-aid system and Govt. provincialization system w.e.f. 25th March,1998 and 1st Jan,2005 respectively.

CRITERION -I: CURRICULAR ASPECT

- Being an affiliated college, the college does not have the flexibility of developing curriculum. However, every effort is taken by the college for effective delivery of the curriculum.
- Student centric learning mechanism, debates, quiz etc. are put in place.

CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

- A number of measures have been introduced for improvement in the quality of teaching learning.
- Student feedback is collected manually.

 Digital Seminar Hall and Digital Classrooms are constructed to enhance teaching methodology.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

- A Network Research cell has been set up to encourage faculties for research and take care
 of any logistics requirements.
- Number of PH.D. and M.Phil. faculties has increased over last 10 years. The number of research publications and minor research projects has also increased.
- Although there is no formal consultancy provided by the college, many faculty members are engaged in providing consultancy at individual levels to other entities.
- The College established Extension Education Cell, Red Ribbon Club etc for community extension activities.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

- The college has introduced a number of facilities such as ICT-equipped advanced Digital Seminar hall and Digital classrooms. Computer lab, Internet access for students and faculties, subscription to INFLIBNET and other journals etc.
- New construction were erect to provide sufficient infrastructure for enhance learning process.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

- Health support facilities are made available to the students.
- The college has active Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Cell, Remedial Coaching Cell, Career Counselling Cell, NCC &NSS and other committees for student support.
- · Remedial coaching is provided.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

- The College practices the principle of quality enhancement and quality assurance. In addition, leadership is groomed through responsibility and accountability. Accordingly, the Principal, along with the IQAC, has created a quality monitoring strategy for teaching and learning.
- Performance appraisals of all faculties are conducted by taking feedback from Students, manually.
- Teachers are given responsibility as coordinators of various committees and made accountable for task delivery as a part of grooming leadership at various levels.

- The college has a vermin-compose plant where biological wastes are decomposing for the formation of vermin-compose manure, which are use for plantation and gardening.
- College also has provisions for rain water hervesting
- A number of innovations have been introduced across teaching learning and governance to improve the overall quality.
- In addition, to meet with the demand for ICT resources, advanced lab has been introduced that is shared across departments.

The college plans and develops action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum. Teachers prepare schedule of work for each subject semester wise. This schedule of work is made available in the department. The curriculum delivery is effectively done through lectures in regular classes which are supplemented by Group Discussions, Seminars and Interactive sessions.

Regular feedback obtained from the stakeholders, with respect to the quality of the enrichment programmes are monitored and evaluated by the IQAC and necessary corrective measures are incorporated in the future if required. The quality of the education imparted to students is monitored and ensured through Internal Quality Assurance Cell.

 - The University conducts Refresher as well as Orientation/ Short term Courses for the benefit of the faculty members. This helps in the updating and upgrading the subject knowledge.

 - College level workshops, seminars and discussions are also organized.

1.3. Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1. Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated.

The college aims to inculcate the highest intellectual standards through rigorous academic commitment and discipline. Almost all departments conduct field survey, study tour. They also conduct participative learning mechanisms such as group discussion and debates regularly. The College academic calendar is prepared every session with the active involvement of the College Internal Examination Committee and Heads of the Departments. Regular feedback obtained from the stakeholders, with respect to the quality of the enrichment programmes, are monitored and evaluated by the IQAC and necessary remedial measures are incorporated in the future.

1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experience of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

The College, being affiliated to the University, does not have the option of formulating its own curriculum. However, a sincere effort is made to modify and enrich the curriculum and teaching-learning process to suit the academic requirements of students through the involvement of faculty and other stakeholders.

Skill oriented programmes are organised to prepare the students for the dynamic employment market. All the departments in the College conduct seminars, workshops, group discussions and field visits to enrich the curriculum.

1.3.3. Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum.

To integrate the cross cutting issues like gender, climate change, environment education, human rights, ICT etc. positively into the curriculum, the college has established Womens' Studies Cell, Environment Cell, Red Ribbon Club, NCC & NSS units and other executive cells and committees. Anti-Ragging Cell and College Disciplinary Committee are also active in the college campus.

World Women Day used to organise to create awareness about Gender issues and promote gender equity.

Environmental studies subject is taught in the university syllabus. Awareness programmes on environmental issues were also organised.

Well equipped computer lab, Digital Seminar hall, Digital Room etc. have also been set up to help the students learn effective use of internet technologies.

1.3.4. What are the various value-add courses/enrichment programmes offered toensure holistic development of student?

Inculcation of Moral and Ethical values:

- The Students are motivated by way of special lectures so as to inculcate moral and ethical values in them
- Community orientation programmes such as Blood Donation camps, Health Check up Camp, Community Extension activities are organized.

Employable and Life Skills:

- The College organises Communication Skills workshops, Quizzes, Debates, Group Discussions, Power Point Presentations at regular intervals both in regional and English language in the institution.
- Career Counselling workshops are organized to orient the students.
- Students are also allotted different responsibilities in organizing various events and activities such as cultural programmes, competitions, seminars, workshops etc. In this way, they improve their team building and organizational skills.

Community Orientation:

 Institution organizes Blood Donation Camp, AIDS awareness, Drug abuse, Environmental awareness programs, and Global warming with active involvement of NSS & NCC units of the college.

1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.

The college networks with the stakeholders to collect and document responses on curriculum from the stakeholders. The students express their opinion on curriculum through response sheets/ feedback. Feedback from Parents on teaching methodology is obtained during Parent Teacher Meeting sessions. Responses on curriculum are also collected from Alumni. The IQAC analyses all these feedbacks. The feedback thus obtained is communicated to the University for appropriate action.

1.3.6. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

As such, the institution does not offer additional enrichment program. But it offers some skill oriented programmes.

The feedback on these programmes in the form of interactions, discussions and suggestions as received through response sheets is analyzed by IQAC. The IQAC monitors and evaluates the efficiency and success of these programs.

Designing and restructuring of courses mainly lies on the Affiliating University. However the existing courses are restructured and updated to meet the requirements by organizing and attending education fairs and seminars/conferences on emerging trends in various sectors. Our faculty keep themselves abreast of the changing national and global trends by attending Refresher Courses and participating in seminars.

The college also invites faculties of national repute and other resource person for guest lecturer and takes feedback on a number of aspects related to curriculum. The relevant recommendations are communicated to the stakeholders.

There is no such formal mechanism for obtaining feedback from the students and also from the stakeholders on the curriculum. An informal level feedback is obtained through discussions with students, parents and alumni.

Such feedback obtained is timely communicated to the university and is also discussed during the curriculum revision, in which our faculty members take part.

No new programe is introduced during last four years.

The admission process is controlled by college and the final list of students is displayed in the college notice board.

The only criterion adopted for admission is merit. The final list of selected students is prepared on merit basis after departmental counseling and displayed in the college notice board.

General: For General courses, the minimum percentage of marks for admission at the entry level is as prescribed by the university eligibility. One of the primary aims of the college is to provide the benefit of education to the lesser privileged and marginalized sections.

Honours/Major: For major courses, the minimum criteria are pass in H.S. and 50% marks in the subject.

As of now, there is no such formal mechanism. At the end of the admission process for each year, a student profile report is prepared for the new batch. This student profile is reviewed by the Governing Body and the Principal.

2.2. Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution fosters a comprehensive academic environment and caters to the specific needs of the differently abled students keeping in mind the Government regulations. College make special arrangements in terms of physical facilities, arranging separate tutorial classes (if required) etc.

The initial assessment of the needs of the students is made through objective test after admission process. To further assess the knowledge base and skill needs of the students pertaining to the specific programme, special orientation lectures based on the basics/fundamentals of the programme/subject concerned are organized. Special sessions are organized to bridge the knowledge gap of the incoming students from different backgrounds. Teachers give extra time to the students to help them cope with the programme to which they are enrolled.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Special orientation lectures based on the basics/fundamentals of the programme/subject concerned, special sessions are organized to bridge the knowledge gap of the incoming students from different backgrounds. Teachers give extra time to the students to help them cope with the programme of their choice.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The College has an active Women Cell. Accordingly, the Women Cell and NSS organizes workshops/seminars on issues such as gender, environment etc. to sensitize its staff and students.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are identified through interactive classroom teaching and classroom discussions. The college also has provision of class tests and quiz through which faculties can identify advanced learners. Various extension lectures are organized to respond to learning needs of advanced learners. Teachers provide additional guidance to them.

How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The students who are at the risk of dropout are identified by analyzing the students' profile. They are also identified from class attendance records, through day-to-day interaction at the classes and from Results of the academic examinations.

The data is analyzed and the following remedial measures are taken:

 Remedial Classes for the disadvantaged sections of society and slow learners are organized.

- Scholarships are given to students from economically weaker sections of society
- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print etc.)

At the beginning of each academic session, an academic calendar for the entire year is prepared. The academic calendar is communicated to the departments. The head of the department, in consultation with the teachers, allocates course to the faculties. Accordingly, timetable is also created.

Principal and IQAC timely reviewed if there is any deviation. If identified then take appropriate measures for correction.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching -learning process?

IQAC improves the teaching-learning process by

- By making teaching-learning more student-centric.
- By monitors the overall academic plan and progress, and reviews deviation if any.
- Motivating faculty members periodically to attend programs on new and emerging technologies
- Ensuring access to computers, internet and computer-aided packages available within the campus.
- Feedback on Teachers is also obtained to assure the quality of teaching-learning.

Learning is made more student-centric by laying stress on specific learning outcomes for courses and making it more participatory and interactive through group activities like Group discussions, Field survey/Field work which while strengthening the knowledge base contribute to skill formation and managerial skills both at personal and interpersonal level. Various cells, clubs and the departments organize Quizzes, Creative, Debates and Poetry competitions to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students.

2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The college promotes creativity amongst students by encouraging them to publish materials in the college magazine, wall magazine etc. They are often motivated by the faculties to take part in co-curricular like debate, quiz, group discussions, cultural activities and also many extension activities which will help them to transform themselves into life-long learners and innovator.

 - Educational trips are organized to give firsthand knowledge to students.

- Career Counselling & Placement cell is established. It provides academic as well as professional counselling to the students.

 Comittee are always available to heed to the problems of the students. Students
 are always free to approach the teachers for any kind of guidance-personal,
 professional and psycho-social. Students come with a burden and special
 endeavours are made to see that they get relief.

The college encourages the faculty to complement the academic system with practical skills through various teaching methodologies that extend beyond the classrooms. The institution helps and encourages the faculty to update and to keep themselves informed about the current technologies and latest developments in their respective fields or branches, and also to improve these skills. They are also encouraged to use computers and internet facilities to deliver better and effective curriculum.

- Faculty members are encouraged to make teaching-learning more interactive and interesting by:
 - · ICT based teaching methods.
 - Field trips
 - Educational trips
- * Feedback on lectures obtained from students.
- Students are allotted topics to prepare class seminars.
- Special classes are held for slow learners and advanced learners.
- Students are encouraged to maintain wall magazine.
- The college is also equipped with LCD, Projectors, and Computers with internet connectivity which can be used by faculties to better their delivery of curriculum.
- The faculty members are also very much encouraged to attend the seminars and conferences.

2.3.9. How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college has a central library, departmental libraries. The library caters to the needs of teachers and students by providing access to text books, reference books etc. The Central library functions on all days except Sundays and Government Holidays. There is Book

Bank facility to cater exclusively to the needs of the underprivileged students. Extra numbers of books are also issued to the Major students. Books for Competitive Examinations are issued to the students. E-resources are hosted through INFLIBNET services. Book exhibitions on campus are organized from time to time to facilitate faculty members to select the books needed for teaching.

2.3.10. Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The Institution has a well academic planned system to ensure curriculum completion within time. Hence the faculties do not face any difficulty in finishing the curriculum. If there is any occurrence where the faculties cannot finish the syllabus in prescribed time, the faculty members take extra classes for the completion of courses.

2.3.11. How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Feedbacks on teachers are obtained from students to assure quality in teaching learning. The feedback obtained is analyzed and the concerned teachers counseled to improve academic standards. In-house meetings of IQAC, Teachers council are held to review the teaching methodology and pedagogical tools employed. Workshops are organized to upgrade the teaching skills in view of the technological advancement and the role of IT in enhancing the quality of higher education.

Faculty members identify slow learners and take necessary steps like special classes for such students to improve their studies. Remedial coaching classes are also continued.

2.4. Teacher Quality

All recruitments are done as per the norms laid down by the University and Govt. of Assam. Assistant Professors/ Associate Professor are selected on the basis of their merit, research experience and their performance in personal interview by an interview panel comprising of competent representatives from the university and state government.

The college has the required number of qualified and competent staff to handle all the courses. However, contractual & visiting/guest faculty members are also appointed when required.

Yes, the college has introduced evaluation of teachers by students. A Performa based on NAAC recommendations has been designed to seek feedback and suggestions of students. This Performa is filled up by the students who evaluate their respective teachers on the basis of their teaching style, methodology or academic skills and their interaction level. The feedback is analyzed by the IQAC along with the Head of the Institution and corrective measures taken to enhance teaching-learning.

At the beginning of the academic year the calendar containing details of all the college activities and general rules of evaluation is displayed on the college and departmental notice board. The details of the evaluation system i.e. Weightage of each component of assessment, attendance and aggregate marks are explained to the students by the faculty members and Heads of the department. Orientation/Induction programme are also organized for freshers.

The college follows all the rules and regulations of the affiliated university when it comes to conduct university exams. According to University Rule, a U.G. student has to get at least 75% attendance to qualify for the final examination.

In order to improve the performance of the students'remedial classes for the weaker students, special coaching classes for the average students and special guidance for the advance learners are arranged. Unit tests, class test (Objective Type or Descriptive Type) are also conducted by the faculties which help them asses the understanding of the students when it comes to the subject.

The examination system of the college inclusive of syllabus designing, setting of question papers, and conduct of examination is according to the pattern of the affiliated university.

However, college has also initiated some reforms.

- Special coaching classes for the average students and special guidance for the advance learners are arranged.
- · Quizzes, Debates, Student's Seminar are also organized.
- Unit tests, class test (Objective Type or Descriptive Type) are also conducted by the faculties which help them asses the understanding of the students when it comes to the subject.
- Award of Merit for students showing outstanding performance in the final examinations.

The college adopts Formative and Summative evaluation approaches to measure student achievement in a programme. Formative evaluation designed to test students is based on tests, assignments, quizzes, debates, seminars, internal examinations etc. It makes the student innovative and also improves the student's performance in the annual examination. The students who scoreless are given the required help through remedial coaching classes which helps them score well.

The college closely monitors the performance of the students through continuous evaluation methods. The evaluation system comprises of class test, unit test, assignments and final exam at the end of the session/ semester. Remedial classes are arranged for students from rural background.

The internal assessment is based on their performance in class test, unit test etc. and participation in co-curricular activities and extension activities. Departmental seminars on the various important topics of the subject are also conducted and evaluated.

The college ensures full transparency in the process of evaluation. If the students have any discontentment in the way their internal papers are evaluated they can get back to the respective teacher or the HOD and get it evaluated again. Answer sheets are shown to the students so that they can learn from their mistakes and improve upon their performance in the future examinations.

The curriculum and the syllabi of the academic programmes offered in this college are transacted in such a way that it clearly stated the leaning outcomes. The college encourages students to develop attitudes of intellectual curiosity and motivation for independent thinking and a commitment to ethical and sustainable practices. Each program is designed and module to ensure that students develop their knowledge as well as understanding. The learning outcomes are communicated to the students right from the beginning of the academic programmes during the departmental orientation session.

Along with the sessional examinations for all the students, the teachers focus on class tests, monthly unit tests, assignments, quizzes, debates and seminars. They evaluate the students on the basis of their performance in these events and review the result of each student. The students' profiles are assessed and special classes are designed for them according to the result outcomes. It enhances the confidence of students and prepares them to face the final examinations.

2.6.3 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

The college has taken many initiatives to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered. These include community extension activities, field visit etc. All the information gathered by these studies are analyzed to make the syllabus more effective and valuable.

Student's performance in the class test, unit test, sessional examination are analysed and special guidance are given where required. Remedial coaching and special classes are also conducted for weaker students which help the students in the university exams.

After each term the respective teacher has a complete report of all the activities of student, i.e. marks in class test, unit test, absentees etc. Teachers analysed those report and special classes are arranged if required. During these classes, the students are provided assignments and seminars keeping in view their present level of their learning. The teacher monitors the academic growth of the students and design further tests, assignments, seminars accordingly.

Monitoring is done by IQAC through feedback mechanism. This is obtained for each course annually. Student centric teaching - learning methods are adopted to ensure the achievements of these learning outcomes.

Personal and psychological mentoring is also provided to the students if required.

The college is affiliated to Gauhati University and the Afiliating University has its own set of rules. However the college has a different way on its own of looking at the attributes of the score by students.

The college ensures the attainment of these attributes by including them in induction programs, course materials, assessment criteria, feedback etc. The students are also encouraged to document their achievement. This kind of approach helps the college in making the students as better persons.

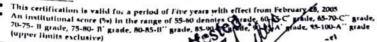

The Peer Team carefully perused and analyzed the self-study report submitted by the Institution. During institutional visit, the team went through all the relevant documents, visited the departments, the facilities, support services, administrative units, examinate examination section and interacted with the various constituents of the institution including including students, faculty, non-teaching staff, alumni and parents. Based on the above

exercise and keeping in mind the criteria identified by NAAC, the peer team has taken the value judgment. The assessment of the institution under various criteria, the commendable features of the institution, the issues of concern and some following pages.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

Saraighat College, a Grant-in-aid college affiliated to the Gauhati University, spread over an area of 5.6 acre. The college was established in 1981 with a mission to promote higher education among the womenfolk as well as the youth belonging to the economically underprivileged section of the people in the greater Changsari area. It is managed by a well balanced team of the Governing Body constituted as per the university and government guidelines.

The college offers education in the faculty of Arts only at UG (B.A.) level in as many as 11 subjects — Anthropology, Assamese, Economics, English, Education, Geography, History, Mathematics, Persian, Philosophy and Political Science, with Major courses in 7 subjects namely, Assamese, English, Economics, Education, History, Philosophy and Political Science. Additionally, the college also offers 4 self-financing courses: (a) Certificate in Computer Fundamentals, (b) Advance Diploma in Computer Programming, (c) Diploma in Multilingual Web Technology, and (d) Swabalamban Rojgar. The College follows curriculum designed and updated at regular intervals by the Gauhati University.

The mission and goals of the institution have been clearly spelt out in the Foundation Document of the college and has also been stated in the prospectus of the college, which is published every year and made available to the students at the time of admission.

The college has been able to buildup reasonable academic and administrative infrastructure to support its activities. The college Governing Body on the approval of the Government has been able to appoint 21 permanent and 11 temporary teachers of whom 2 holds Ph.D. and 8 hold M. Phil. degrees. The teacher student ratio is 1:14. The ratio of the full time teachers to part time teachers is 1.9:1 and the ratio of teaching staff to non-teaching staff is 2.38:1 in the last academic year. The number of working and teaching days was 271 and 183 respectively during the year of reference. The average workload of a teacher is about 6 hours per day.

Since, it is rural based college especially aiming at providing educational facilities to the students belonging to the greater Changsari area, students enrolled hail from the same State. The institution has currently 450 students on roll in UG and 20 in different

self-financing courses. The drop out rate of the students appears to be high. Out of 248 dropped out within four months and of those who continued their students (19.76%) (57.8%) appeared in the final examination. Similarly, of 287 students admitted in the year 1000, as many as 89 (31.01%) students dropped out within 4 months and of the rest only 110 (55.6%) appeared in the final examination.

The library has a modest stock of 5626 books and it subscribes only 5 National Journals/Periodicals.

The college follows, regulations related to all academic activities including holding of examination, approved by the Gauhati University.

Presently the college offers education in a few self-financing Certificate/Diploma courses with strong job potentialities. It is required that the College should obtain recognition of the UGC under 2f and 12B. Consequently, it may avail itself of the UGC funding for 5 years for running Career oriented programmes such as Hospitality Management, Tourism Management, Disaster Management and other Frontline courses in Computer Science/Information Technology.

CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The college follows a transparent admission policy. Admission in various courses is done strictly on the basis of merit, i.e. the marks obtained in the qualifying examination. To select major courses, the students have to appear at a selection test (written or oral) through which they are assessed as to their knowledge and skill. The Reservation rules of the State Government are implemented in letter and spirit.

The process of teaching and learning has been designed carefully with necessary planning of pedagogy and delivery methods.

The College follows the syllabus prepared by the University. The syllabi are unitized according to a teaching scheduled through the academic year. The head of the department together his/her departmental colleagues prepares subject wise work schedule and discuss allotment of the syllabus contents among themselves for teaching and learning.

Teaching plan is prepared at the beginning of each academic session considering in various parameters specially the course contents, number of teaching days, unit tests, test examinations, annual and final examinations.



The college monitors the overall performance of students at the beginning of the year by means of regular maintenance of students' attendance register, class tests and unit tests, maintenance of discipline and performance in non-scholastic activities as well as co-curricular activities.

The unsuccessful candidates in the degree final examinations are given fresh chances of taking admission and attending regular classes in the college. This provision works as remedial course for educationally disadvantaged students. On the other hand advanced learners are given more assignments and also encouraged to read extra reference books obtainable from library and faculty members. Teachers maintain personal contacts and help such students by offering reference books and textbooks from personal libraries.

The college supplements the lecture method of teaching by encouraging the students to participate in interaction, group discussion, debate, seminar, field visits and excursions and Arts Competition.

In the regular posts the teachers are recruited through the process of advertisement and selection through an Interview Board. The Board consists of the Principal, one GB member, one government nominee and two subject experts from a recognized university. The Board makes the panel of deserving candidates. Then the GB selects the candidate to be appointed from among the candidates in the panel. Finally, the recruitment of the candidate has to be approved by the Director of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam. However, the college has a freedom to appoint teachers purely on temporary basis with consolidated pay financed from the college fund.

The teachers update their knowledge by attending orientation and refresher courses organized in different Universities and also by participating in the seminars and workshops of National and International levels. So far 22 (14+8) teachers have benefited by attending refresher courses and 21(5+16) by orientation courses. Twelve teachers by attending refresher courses and 21(5+16) by orientation courses. Twelve teachers have participated in the national level seminars/conferences/workshops, while 4 participated in the seminars/conference/workshop held at the international level.

The college teaching and working days are 188 and 274 respectively which stand at reasonable level.

The college follows the self appraisal method to evaluate the performance of the faculty members. The teachers are encouraged for good performance as the feedback from the self-appraisal is used as a basis for promotion, facilitation to undergo refresher courses, orientation programmes and seminar participation. CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Research is not a significant activity of the college. Among the teachers, only two holds a Ph.D. degree and eight have done their M.Phil. Nevertheless, teachers are encouraged to conduct research through grant of study leave and adjustment in the teaching schedule. Five teachers have registered for Ph.D. The college has not taken up any research project or consultancy job. Seventeen teachers have attended national/international seminars/workshops in the last three years. Five departments (English, Assamese, Pol. Sc., Education and Economics) organized seminars.

Five Departments have started publication of Departmental journals.

The college conducts extension and awareness programmes such as Community Development, Health and Hygiene Awareness, AIDS Awareness, Medical Camp and Environmental Awareness and other social works in the neighboring villages. Additionally, the college conducts soft-toy making and flower making workshops. It conducts a programme on idle time management for rural students. It has also started Child Development Programme in collaboration with Dr. Ambedkar Mission, Assam.

One of the faculty members has been given additional charge to organize extension activities, programmes. The college motivates the teachers to pursue some relevant and purposeful extension activities by encouraging the students of the college and thus inculcating in them a sense of service, team spirit and concern for each other. The college also works and plans the extension activities with some local NGO's

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING

The Saraighat College is located in the rural area. The college campus is spread over an area of 5.6 acres including a playground. At present, the college runs in the Assam-type buildings with the Office-cum-Principal's room, a library, 9 class rooms, Boys' and Girls' and teachers' common rooms, laboratories for education, anthropology and geography students, an auditorium that can accommodate about 700 persons and a few other rooms used for store, union activities and computer facilities. The college has proposed RCC building/structures.

The construction committee of the college looks into the maintenance of its infrastructure. All maintenance and repairing costs are met from the college development fund. The college has ensured optimum utilization of the infrastructure facilities. The class rooms are always in use since the rotation system of classes is followed in the class rooms are always in use since the rotation system of classes is followed in the college routine. It also allows some social agencies to use its physical infrastructure on college routine. The College GB has constituted a Beautification Committee holidays and vacations. The College GB has constituted a



comprising a group of teachers and students. Under its initiation some flower and trees have been planted in the campus to make it beautiful and pollution-free.

The college library has over 5.6 thousand books (2275 titles) in the stock and subscribes 5 national journals/periodicals. Computerization of the library has begun, but management is poor.

In collaboration with C-DAC (Maligaon Centre), the computer center of the college offers various self-financing courses such as Advanced Diploma in Computer Programming (ADCP), PG Diploma in Computer Application (PGDCA), Diploma in Multilingual Web Technology and Certificate in Computer Fundamentals. The college provided accommodation to C-DAC which has installed its own computers. The computer center is normally accessible on all working days between 10 AM to 4 PM.

Although the college has not been able to build a permanent sports and physical seducation center, it provides the students with facilities for cricket, football, volleyball, sedminton, and athletics and required playing grounds. There is a teacher in-charge who supervises all the activities related with games and sports.

During the annual college week various games & sports competitions are arganized and the winners are awarded prizes and trophies. Some of them are selected to participate in inter-college sports meets. Recently, the students of the college have sarticipated in the regional level sports and University sports.

The college has no regular health service. However, it provides health services to students and members of teaching and non-teaching staff through a physician of the lead PHC, who visits the college every month. The first aid facilities are available in the sollege.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The college admitted a total of 535 (UG) students during the two years (1999 and under report. Of these, a total of 138 (25.79%) dropped out within 4 months of ission. Finally, after completing the necessary requirements only 225 (52.06% of the ited) appeared at the examination and only 153 (28.6% of the admitted students and of those who finally appeared in the examination) passed out.

The college has not been able to keep a systematic record of pass outs qualifying various UGC examinations, joining further studies (UG to PG to Ph.D.) or joining However, the college alumni are holding prominent positions as schoolteachers, advocates, journalists and self-employed entrepreneurs.

The prospectus, published and updated annually, contains details of the goals and ectives, rules of admission, courses offered, admission procedure, fees structure.



examination pattern, curricular and co-curricular aspects, facilities available, scholarships & financial aids, academic calendar, etc.

Scholarships for SC, ST and OBC students are available from the State Government. During 2001-02 a total amount of Rs. 7,67,784 was granted as the financial anotable decline. Recently, student's welfare committee has selected 10 poor students for a scholarship of Rs. 400.00 each.

The college has a provision for exemption of admission fees of students showing good results.

The college provides modest recreational and leisure time facilities to the students. Among these facilities indoor games, outdoor games, debate club, cultural programmes and students' magazine are important.

The college does not have any Employment Cell or the Career Counseling Cell. However, the teachers informally participate in academic and personal counseling. Besides, a committee for Career Counseling and Guidance & NSS unit has been constituted and this committee advises the students on the related matters.

The college has a recently formed alumni association. The alumni donated for their first get-together and cultural show and organized a quiz competition. They also offered suggestions for the all round development of the college.

The college extends recreational & leisure facilities to its students. Students are encouraged to participate cultural activities & to write articles in the college magazine.

CRITERION VI : ORGANISATION AND MANAGEMENT

Saraighat College is affiliated to Gauhati University as a deficit-grants-in-aid college. It is managed by a Governing Body. The Governing Body and the Principal in coordination of the heads of various departments monitor the overall functioning of the college. The representatives of teachers and the non-teaching staff put up their opinion and their views are taken into account by the Governing Body. There is a Steering Committee to look into the overall development of the college. This committee comprises members from among the teachers, the office staff, the GB and the Principal. Under this committee there are thirteen subcommittees: the Academic Committee, the Admission Committee, the Examination Committee, the Disciplinary Committee, the Construction Committee, the Planning Budgeting & Funds Generating Committee, the College Beautification Committee, etc. These committees look after their respective concern. To improve the organization and management of the college these internal committees have a number of suggestions which help the Governing Body to make administration, regardement, maintenance and the academic programmes work better.



The Grievance Redressal Cell looks after the grievances of the teachers and employees. Whenever any grievance or complaint comes to the notice of the Cell, it tries to dispose it off at the earliest and give relief to the aggrieved party or parties concerned.

The Purchase Committee is empowered to take decisions regarding the purchase of all major items. Complete transparency is maintained in financial matters. College account is audited by internal auditors appointed by the GB.

Various kinds of loan facility are available to the members of teaching and non-teaching staff. The Mutual Aid Fund provides general and emergency loan at a minimum Further, all the employees on sanctioned posts may avail loans covering various schemes of the college may also obtain loans from the Contributory Provident Fund.

At present there is no in-built mechanism to check the work efficiency of the non-teaching staff. However, the college has organized a training programme for the professional development of the non-teaching staff. The Principal looks after the overall work efficiency of the college employees.

CRITERION VII : HEALTHY PRACTICES

Although the college has not so far devised a formal mechanism for internal quality checks, it takes feedback from students, alumni, and teachers. The feedback is analyzed and reviewed by the Principal and the Governing Body with the help of a group of experienced teachers and suitable action is taken. The institution has also developed various practices to imbibe values in its constituencies. Some of the notable practices are

- Balanced and sensitive Governing Body consisting of the men of importance in the area
- Transparent admission system based on marks obtained by the candidate in the qualifying examination and through entrance tests for admission in major subjects.
- Unitized syllabus with system of internal assessment through unit tests, annual tests and final tests.
- Encouraging teachers for attending refresher and orientation courses, seminars and work shops for updating their knowledge and skill.



- Providing facilities to the faculty members for carrying out research work, by way of allowing study leave and adjustment in classes.
- Organizing seminars, quiz, debates, group discussions, field visits & excursions for the students to supplement the classroom teaching.
- The college has introduced dress-code.
- NSS has been introduced.
- One annual newsletter has been published recently.
- Encouraging students to participate in social work such as Community Development, Social Work, Medical Camp, AIDS Awareness, Environment Awareness, etc.
- Continuous effort to sensitise the students to human and moral values through literary and cultural programs and for a and inculcate among them the civic responsibilities and community orientation through social services and awareness programmes.
- · Preparation of teaching plan by the departments and its proper implementation
- · Strictness in student attendance.
- Transparency in financial matters, regular maintenance of account and its audit by internal auditors appointed by GB.
- Appointment of teachers through advertisement, interviews and final approval
 of the Government.
- Imparting education in IT-based self-financing short-term certificate and diploma courses having high job potentialities and also in Swabalamban Rojgar course preparing the youth for self-employment.
- Grievance Redressal Cell to look into the grievances of teachers and nonteaching staff.

OVERALL ANALYSIS

The PEER Team after perusing the self-study report and assessing the various scademic and infrastructure facilities of Saraighat College appreciates the vision and soals of the institution in the cause of promoting higher education in the surrounding area mainly inhabited by the people of low-income group. The college has made significant progress in enlarging its academic activities by offering courses in B.A. General and



Major. It is also preparing the students for self-employment through a formal course on Saebalamban Rojgar. It has a balanced team of young and energetic teachers, which shoulder the responsibilities by adopting appropriate teaching-learning methods. The eniazed system of syllabus is very much appreciable as it goes long way in proper realization of the knowledge and skill of the students. Though, the college is located in area with limited facility for research the faculty members are encouraged to carry research work as far as practicable. The college is running under a determined and leadership of the committed and sensitive Governing Body. The college has sequate infrastructure facilities for teaching up to Degree standard, but, the Laboratories Anthropology, Education and Geography departments' and Library need further mentation and modernization in view of the future growth of the college. The number books (and titles) in the Central Library of the college is rather inadequate in view of number of students (including the HS students who use the library books). The mober of journals/periodicals subscribed by the college in rather inadequate. Although se college has been running three computer-based courses, the college office and the sectral library remains to be computerized. Reprographic facilities in the library is an enertly necessity. The college has already proposed for the new (RCC) building which materialized would provide adequate space for various activities of the college.

COMMENDATIONS

The Peer Team would like to commend the institution for the following -

- Dedication and Commitment of the teaching and the non-teaching staff of the college.
- Effective leadership, participative management and good human relationship resulting in efficient team work.
- Strict discipline and work culture.
- Unitized syllabus, which enable regular evaluation of the students.
- Grievance Redressal Cell for speedy disposal of complaints from the teachers/non-teachers.
- IT-based short term courses.
- Swabalamban Rojgar course to prepare the students for self-employment.



RECOMMENDATIONS

The Peer Team like to suggest the following measures to the institution to consider in the interest of providing quality education -

- More student support services like Placement Cell/Career counseling Cell, better sports facilities and personality development programmes.

 NCC unit should be started.
- Possibility of introducing more self-employment courses such as physical education, mushroom cultivation, disaster management etc.
- Augmentation of Library facilities especially the number of books in the library and to subscribe more journals and periodicals.
- Laboratory infrastructure of Anthropology, Education and Geography departments needs immediate augmentation for quality education.
- Language Lab may be setup in the Deptt. of English. A course in conversational English should be started.
- 6) Department of Music, Art and Culture may be established.
- Construction of more buildings for expansion of departments, library, athletics facilities.
- There is an urgent need of periodical health check up, toilet facilities and drinking water facilities for students.

The college is fortunate to have committed management, Principal and staff for its stranged advancement. The college should continue to strive hard to sustain reputation the collective efforts of the management, Principal, faculty and non-teaching
